



Watershed Snow Surveys



First snow survey of 2024

- 10 samples taken at 7 survey sites in SNC watershed
 - Surveys taken twice a month
- Important information for flood forecasting and warning

- Unusual Weather: Another minor Freshet event in February
- Temperature of 10°C on February 9th

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
Mapping Natural Hazards

Natural hazards are identified to ensure <u>safe and sustainable development</u> and to <u>protect people and property</u>.

Natural hazard mapping identifies <u>floodplains</u> and <u>riverine</u> <u>erosion hazard</u> areas on the landscape





Hazard 1: Floodplain





- Floodplains are low lying areas next to a watercourses that are not ordinarily cover by water.
- Provincial Standards: 100 Year
 Flood Event Standard, which has a 1% chance of occurring in any given year.
- Floodplain is mapped using a combination of on-the-ground field work and computer modelling.

Hazard 2: Riverine Erosion




- Erosion hazard areas are areas potentially subject to land regression. The Riverine Erosion Hazard Components: slopes stability, toe erosion, access and meander belt.
- **Provincial Standards:** 100 Year Erosion Rate Standard which is the average annual rate of recession extended over a hundred-year time span

Mapping erosion hazard is a GIS desktop exercise using LiDAR and aerial photography



Regulation Line






<u>Regulation Line</u> is determined by greatest hazard of either floodplain or riverine erosion hazards




Flood hazard Mapping for the Bear Brook River at the confluence with the SNR

- Updates to the flood hazard are required due to:
 - ✓ Longer meteorological data
 - High-resolution topography maps
 - \checkmark Advanced modeling tools
- Erosion hazard has been studied in delineating the regulation line. This results in a larger regulated area in some cases

South Branch of the South Nation River Regulation Line




Bear Brook Regulation Line






Castor River Regulation Line





Emergency Tools



- Developing Emergency
 Management Tools: water depth, access and egress, water velocity, extent of flooding area during flood event.
- To identify vulnerable buildings, roads, and driveways within these flood extents.
- Defining the potential flood extents as climate changes, 200, 350, 500, and 1000 year storm
