The audited financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standards. The audited statements and various letters have been reviewed and approved by staff. Scott Hodgson, Baker Tilly, will be presenting the audited financial statements and audit reporting letter.

#### Surplus

Staff estimated the 2019 surplus at \$358,874 in the 2020 budget approved in November 2019. The surplus prior to transferring additional monies to the operating reserve was \$506,201 (\$358,874 plus \$147,327).

In the draft audited financial statements, there is a surplus of \$643,617.

Net transfer to reserve (\$141,197)



The surplus is due to staff vacancies and leaves, successful fundraising, new project revenues, and increased staff recoveries. Note, revenues not realized in some project areas were offset by reduced expenditures.

#### Reserve

Funds are transferred to and (from) reserve to meet budget provisions: to set up specific reserves for future use; and/or bring back into operations previous amounts set aside for specific purposes; and to meet the requirements of the Board.

The 2019 budget included a net transfer of \$132,443 from reserve.

In March 2019, the board approved the following:

FURTHER THAT: The Board of Directors approve a 2019 transfer from reserve in the amount of \$40,000 for generator approved in 2018 to be purchased 2019.

The approved 2020 budget provided a 2019 net transfer forecast of \$132,826 from reserve.

The Draft Financial Statement now includes a net transfer <u>to</u> reserve of \$141,197 (\$181,197 - \$40,000).

The reserve transfer change between 2019 budget and 2019 actual is primarily due to increased project revenues and surplus in other program areas.

## **SNC Standing Committee Mandates**

The South Nation Conservation Standing Committees Terms of Reference (ToR) refers to a mandate for each committee; however. Each Standing Committee reviewed a draft mandate at their March 5<sup>th</sup>, 2020 meeting; recommended mandates for each Committee are attached.

# SNC 2020 Standing Committee Member Listing

As per the ToR, Standing Committee membership is annually reviewed and approved by the Board of Directors at their March meeting. Committee membership is a maximum of 15 members plus 3 Board ex-officio members; however, additional members may be added with 75% majority vote of the committee at which there is quorum and is subject to Board approval. The Clean Water Committee is recommending an additional 4 members, and Forestry is recommending 1 additional member, bringing the total membership to 19 and 16 members respectively, plus 3 Board ex-officio members. A listing of recommended membership for each Standing Committee is attached.

# **SNC Standing Committee Mandates**

#### **Communications Committee Mandate**

The Communications Committee will provide stakeholder input to the delivery of SNC programs, including but not limited to environmental education and outreach programs, discussion of promotion, special events, fundraising activities and volunteering to represent SNC at public events and outreach activities.

The Committee will review and make recommendations for cost-share grant approvals under the Community Environmental Grants Program, as per approved guidelines.

Committee members will help increase public awareness of SNC's landowner stewardship initiatives, support the creation of partnerships, and build community support with the public, stakeholder groups, government agencies, academics and environmental organizations.

Stakeholder representation may include, but is not limited to, the following: media, teachers, municipal staff and politicians, local environmental groups; and public members-at-large with knowledge of the marketing, communications and fundraising sectors.

#### **Forestry Committee Mandate**

The Forestry Committee will provide stakeholder input to SNC's delivery of its forestry stewardship programs and management of SNC Forests, including the 20-Year Forest Management Plan and 5-Year Operating Plans. Committee members will help increase public awareness of SNC's landowner stewardship initiatives, support the creation of partnerships and build community support with the public, stakeholder groups, government agencies, academics and other environmental organizations. Members may also serve as Forest Stewards helping SNC to monitor and report on various SNC owned properties.

Stakeholder representation may include, but is not limited to, the following: local woodlot associations; Counties Forests; First Nations; forest industry; Eastern Ontario Model Forest; Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry; local environmental groups; local woodlot owners, and public members-at-large with knowledge of local forests and/or the forestry industry.

#### Fish and Wildlife Committee Mandate

The Fish and Wildlife Committee will provide stakeholder input to SNC's management, monitoring and implementation of habitat restoration and stewardship projects. Committee members will help increase public awareness of SNC's fisheries and wildlife initiatives, support the creation of partnerships and build community support with the public, stakeholder groups, government agencies, academics and other environmental organizations. Committee members will support fish and wildlife educational programs



delivered to the public, youth, and students, including Youth Fish Camps and the Youth Hunt (a partnership with Delta Waterfowl).

Stakeholder representation may include, but is not limited to, the following: local fish and game clubs, program partners; First Nations; local anglers, hunters, and trappers; provincial and federal departments; local environmental groups; academia/ researchers, and public members-at-large with knowledge of local fisheries and wildlife.

#### **Clean Water Committee Mandate**

The Clean Water Committee will provide South Nation Conservation (SNC) with stakeholder input on water quality/quantity programs and related research and stewardship projects. The Committee will review and make recommendations for cost-share grant approvals under the Clean Water Program, Ottawa Rural Clean Water Program (ORCWP) and Eastern Ontario Water Resources Program (EOWRP), as per each Program's approved guidelines and grant structure. Committee members will help increase public awareness of SNC's landowner stewardship initiatives and cost-share grant programs, support the creation of partnerships and build community support with the public, stakeholder groups, government agencies, academics and other environmental organizations. Committee members may serve as program representatives helping to liaise between SNC and interested program applicants.

Stakeholder representation may include, but is not limited to, the following: agricultural organizations; Partner Programs (ORCWP and EOWRP); member municipalities; provincial and federal agricultural departments; agri-businesses; local environmental groups; local farmers, and public members-at-large with knowledge of local water resources.

Subject: Update: Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Board of Directors receive and file the Summary of Actions 2011-2020: Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area;

FURTHER THAT: The Board of Directors approves staff submitting letters to the Provincial and Federal governments, on an annual basis, to request funding to purchase the remaining residences in the Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area on willing vendor basis;

FURTHER THAT: If vendors in the Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area approach the Authority to purchase residences, decisions to purchase be debated by the Board, at the time, in consultation with Nation Municipality, on the merits – considering appropriate advice, market values, budget pressures, and other considerations that the Board deems appropriate; and

FURTHER THAT: Current Residents be copied on the annual Provincial and Federal government funding request letters.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area (the "Landslide Area") is a 20 km stretch of the South Nation River between Casselman and Lemieux susceptible to large-scale retrogressive landslides. There are currently 27 residences and several roads in the Nation Municipality within the Landslide Area.

A summary of SNC's action in the Landslide Area 2011-2020 is attached as well as the Summary Report prepared with financial and administrative support from the Government of Canada through the National Disaster Mitigation Program.

The Landslide Area has been studied over the past three decades in response to several large-scale landslides, occurring most recently in 1971 and 1993. In the years prior to the

1993 Lemieux Landslide, the Authority successfully acquired 28 homes in the former Hamlet of Lemieux, on a willing vendor basis. The Lemieux properties were purchased using funds from the following sources:

SNC 10% Ministry of Natural Resources 85% Municipality 5%



Provincial funding for acquisitions of homes within the Landslide Area has not been available since the early 1990s.

The Authority possesses peer reviewed geotechnical reports that indicate a major retrogressive landslide can occur in the Landslide Area at any time without warning, endangering lives and resulting in the loss of buildings, infrastructure, and land. There are currently 27 residences remaining in the Landslide Area.

The Authority faces potential liability concerns regarding this file. The summary highlights the Authority's efforts to mitigate future risk.

Since 2011, staff have presented options to the Board and Municipality for future acquisitions in the Landslide Area. As of the approval of the 2020 SNC Budget, the Board supported a reserve fund to support the purchase of homes in the Landslide Area on a willing vendor basis. The 2020 SNC Budget allocation is \$25,000.

A Summary Report has been prepared for the Working Group including Board Members and the Nation Municipality for review, along with updated Geotechnical Review Guidelines for studies completed within the Landslide Area. Following this review, the report and guidelines will be presented to the Board of Directors.

# **Summary of Actions 2011-2020: Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area**

- 1. November 2011: The Board received a report on capital resource management projects, including, the Casselman to Lemieux potential retrogressive landslide area (the "Area"). A 3% levy increase (\$75,000), for 20 years, to purchase property (on a willing seller basis) was requested and denied. Staff were directed to work with the Municipality and SNC legal counsel to determine an appropriate approach to interact with property owners in the Area and provide free access to engineer studies in the Authority's possession.
- 2. February 2012: A report was presented to the Board for approval. The work plan included: legal counsel evaluating insurance coverage; communicating with Residents in the Area; seeking funding from MPs and MPPs; evaluating the science used to delineate the Area; and a levy increase of 3% per year to establish a \$300,000 reserve to buy homes on a willing seller basis. Board Resolution BD-015/12 approves all items of the Plan except the levy increase proposal, which staff bring back to the Board.
- 3. <u>April 2012:</u> Staff and legal counsel from SNC and Municipality met to discuss the Area and create a summary of follow-up items: insurance; methodology for determining the protective zone; providing a list of the properties in the Area; seeking a legal summary; considering market value of the lands; hosting a public meeting to discuss the potential hazard with residents.
- 4. <u>June 2012:</u> Board discussed the potential retrogressive landslide area as a capital report and declined to fund purchase of homes within the Area on a willing seller basis from SNC Budget but agreed that the Municipality and SNC should meet to discuss the Area and any associated issues and/or concerns.
- 5. August 2012: SNC acquired a property on Lacroix Road within the Area (SNC 130).
- 6. <u>December 5, 2012:</u> Residents living within the Area were invited (via a registered letter) to a general, information meeting regarding the Area at the Municipality's office. At this meeting, the Residents were informed that SNC would work with the Municipality to review the existing technical studies and ask technical experts about the state of science of potential retrogressive landslide areas.
- 7. <u>February 21, 2013</u> (WECI): A formal request for funding (\$100,000) was made to the MNRF to ensure the existing studies are still applicable or to update the studies and to buy property from landowners.
- 8. <u>February 25, 2013:</u> Seeking assistance from the Province of Ontario, a joint request was made by the Municipality and SNC to be heard by the Minister at the Ontario Good Roads Association Conference in Toronto. The request was granted (Ministry



of Natural Resources). Representatives from the Municipality and SNC requested support from the Minister. Specifically, the Ministry was asked to fund the purchase of homes in the Area, on a willing seller basis, at a rate of about one home per year until the homes in the area had been purchased. The Minister's representative acknowledged the issue though declined to commit provincial resources to the Area. MPP for P-R, Grant Crack, was in attendance at the meeting.

- 9. Early 2013: Purchase of Gary Bradley Property in Casselman-Lemieux Area.
- 10. <u>April 2013:</u> The Municipality and SNC work with experts in the discipline of retrogressive landslide science to complete a literature review of the science studies completed for the area, which where 15 years old at the time. The results were compiled in August 2013.
- 11. <u>January 2014:</u> SNC and the Municipality held a meeting with local MP, Mr. Pierre Lemieux. The issue of residents living in the Area was acknowledged, but no funding was committed.
- 12. <u>Spring 2014:</u> Meeting with Municipality, County, SNC, and the Ministère des Transport du Québec (MTQ) to discuss the Area and potential future partnerships, leading to LiDar data acquisition, and further study of the Area.
- 13. <u>Summer 2014:</u> Information for Emergency Management Plan: SNC has completed the following to update the Municipality's Emergency Management Plan: provided an updated contact list of local geotechnical consultant; added a landslide information webpage to the SNC website; planning files have been organized for all properties with residences in the zone; and full scale maps (zone, residences, structures) have been provided to the Municipality.
- 14. <u>Summer 2014</u>: An inspection to confirm the structural integrity of the Seguinbourg Berm is being conducted. The Municipality and SNC met with a lawyer to develop a work plan to access the berm should future maintenance be required. Quotes were obtained and approved by the Board for a survey of the berm. The work was completed in the spring of 2015.
- 15. November 2014: A property on Lacroix Road, within the Area was donated to SNC (SNC 154).
- 16. <u>November 2014:</u> Presentation made to MNR in Peterborough concerning the current status of homes existing within the Area, outlining the work completed to date and the current situation, in addition to requesting provincial funding to assist with the Area.
- 17. <u>December 2014:</u> Terms of Reference: Morey Associates Consulting Engineers developed specific Terms of Reference for undertaking geotechnical investigations to update the Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area. Terms of Reference were



peer reviewed by a geotechnical consultant (BGC Engineering). SNC will meet with the Municipality once the terms of reference are finalized.

- 18. <u>April 3 &10, 2014:</u> Two Open Houses were held at the Municipality's office to discuss the findings of the technical review of the science behind the potential retrogressive landslide maps and address concerns of residents.
  - a. Open House #1: Thursday April 3, 4 p.m. 7 p.m.
     30 property owners were invited by registered mail; including those with a residence within the Area and those invited to the 2012 Open House 15 invitees attended (22 residents total).
  - b. Open House #2: Thursday April 10, 4 p.m. 7 p.m. Open House was advertised in the local Paper (Le Reflet) and on the Municipality and SNC websites. Six residents attended. At both Open Houses, landowners had an opportunity to speak one-on-one with Municipal or SNC staff to ask questions and express concerns. Most property owners who attended the Open House were seeking information about the Area and recent work completed. Most property owners asked why the open house was being hosted. The response: to remind property owners that they are in a potential landslide zone to inform property owners of the results of a review of the science behind the landslide maps / setback lines to address the concerns of property owners.

Note: MNR was invited to attend both Open Houses but declined the invitation.

- 19. <u>Spring 2015</u>: LiDAR: The Ministère des Transport du Quebec (MTQ) obtained LiDAR (unprocessed) in spring 2014 within Québec, near Eastern Ontario. UCPR and SNC partnered with MTQ to purchase LiDAR for the entire UCPR and a reach along Bear Brook, MTQ will assist with data processing. LiDAR data can be used to support future landslide studies.
- 20. <u>Fall 2014 Summer 2015:</u> Field Studies: MTQ and Laval University studied the 1971 South Nation Landslide and the 1993 Lemieux Landslide. On-site geotechnical investigations consisted of cone penetration tests, borehole sampling, installation of piezometer nests and vane tests. SNC assisted with obtaining permissions and preparing the necessary permits.
- 21. <u>2015 Present:</u> Data Management: SNC begins to develop a geospatial database of existing geotechnical data.
- 22. <u>2015 Present:</u> Requests to the Federal and Provincial governments via the local MPP and MP are made seeking financial support to purchase homes in the Area or delineate more accurate hazard lines.
- 23. <u>September 2015:</u> The assessment of the Seguinbourg Berm to confirm the structural integrity was completed. Overall structural integrity of the berm still intact. Minor erosion works recommended.



- 24. May 9<sup>th</sup>, 2016: A capital report for the Area was presented to the Board. Board resolution BD-073/16 approved that staff submit letters annually to Provincial and Federal governments to request funding to purchase the remaining residences in the Area and that if vendors in the Area, approach the Authority to purchase residences, decisions to purchase be debated by the Board, at the time, in consultation with Nation Municipality, on the merits.
- 25. <u>September 2016</u>: Staff submitted a request to the NDMP for \$ 1,250,000.00 (Board resolution BD-123/16). The Municipality elected not to proceed with the Project due to lack of funding.
- 26. <u>January 9, 2017:</u> (WECI) A report was presented to the Board for approval. As part of the 2017-2018 Water and Erosion Control Infrastructure program (\$5,000) the Seguinbourg Berm Vegetation Assessment would assess the impact of the vegetation growth on the berm and provide removal recommendations if required.
- 27. <u>April 20, 2017:</u> The annual capital report for the Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area was presented to the Board for approval.
- 28. <u>July 2017</u>: SNC sends its annual letter to the local MPP and MP requesting Provincial and Federal financial support to purchase homes in the Area and/or delineate more accurate hazard lines.
- 29. <u>September 15, 2017</u>: Staff submit a request to the Natural Disaster Mitigation Program seeking \$ 100,000 for a pilot project in the area.
- 30. <u>September 2017</u>: SNC sends letters to landowners within the Area as a reminder of some of the elements of risk to people and property within the Area, and as a reminder of SNC's annual request for funding support to the Provincial and Federal Governments to purchase property from willing sellers.
- 31. <u>January 31, 2018</u>: SNC received the Seguinbourg Berm Vegetation Assessment Report prepared by Geofirma Engineering Ltd. The assessment states that the vegetation documented during the site investigation is not considered to be problematic from a berm integrity or stability aspect. It was recommended that a follow-up vegetation assessment be conducted every two years.
- 32. <u>May 2018 Present</u>: The Natural Disaster Mitigation Program funding is approved. The pilot project seeks to develop a mitigation/relocation program to provide willing landowners with an opportunity to reduce risks by removing their dwelling from the Area.
- 33. September 2018: SNC sends the annual letter to landowners within the Area.
- 34. <u>January 2019</u>: SNC and Municipal staff verify the number of remaining residences in the Area.



- 35. May 2019: SNC sends letters to landowners within the Area as a reminder of some of the elements of risk to people and property within the area, and as a reminder of SNC's annual request for funding support to the Provincial and Federal Governments to purchase property from willing sellers.
- 36. <u>April 2020</u>: SNC submits the peer reviewed Guidelines for Geotechnical Studies within the Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area for technical review.
- 37. <u>May 2020</u>: The Annual Update: Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area report presented to the SNC Board of Directors.
- 38. <u>Summer 2020</u>: SNC the Summary Report and the Guidelines for Geotechnical Studies within the Casselman to Lemieux Potential Retrogressive Landslide Area to the Working Group for review.

**Subject:** Update: SNC Operations during the Pandemic

#### RECOMMENDATION:

The Board of Directors receive and file an update on SNC Operations during the Pandemic.

#### DISCUSSION:

#### 1. Staff Working from Home

As with many employers, we have moved most of its operations out of the office, to do its part in maintaining social distancing. Most SNC staff are working remotely. SNC has suspended in-person meetings, but remain available to connect with clients by phone, email, or video conferencing.

SNC has ensured its staff are equipped to maintain the continuity of our operations, and SNC remains at full capacity to continue operations and address all issues arising out of COVID-19.

#### 2. Staff Working from Office and Field

In response to the COVID-19 Pandemic, South Nation Conservation (SNC) developed standard operating procedures (SOP) to specifically address protecting staff and the public from transmission of COVID-19 while performing field work and indoor work. Procedures are used in conjunction with other relevant Health and Safety Policies in place.

In addition, all SNC field activities require work plans with detailed job tasks and measures to specifically address COVID-19 transmission (e.g. social distancing, personal protective equipment, hand sanitization, etc.). These documents are updated based on information and direction provided by government and health authorities.

For all work activities, staff travel to work sites in separate vehicles, maintain minimum distances of 2 metres from others, and have their own assigned personal protective equipment. Staff do not share equipment and tools.

This report provides an update on some key field work activities complete to date and planned through June 2020.



# **Field Operations:**

#### A) Septic and Regulation Inspection Site Visits

SNC's Septic Inspectors and Regulations Officer continue to complete site visits associated with permitting applications. Inspectors conduct the site visit while no one is on-site; if the landowner or contractor wish to attend, they must remain inside their home or vehicle and communicate with inspectors via cellphone. If other contractors or inspectors are on-site at the time of the inspections, physical distancing is maintained. Septic contractors have been made aware of this change in site visit protocols.

SNC continues to support applications and documents submitted electronically or by fax, instead of mailed, if possible.

#### **B) Physical Infrastructure**

#### Water Control Structures

Mandatory inspections are carried out by SNC staff and contractors to ensure safe operations. Safety booms were installed on watercourses following spring dam operations.

#### SNC Lands and Conservation Areas

Staff continue to conduct field operations (e.g. tree marking, forest inventories, tree risk assessments, trail inspections, etc.) and have worked with contractors to support maintenance and hazard tree work.

SNC trails at Conservation Areas are open for passive recreation (e.g. hiking), except for the Leitrim and Alfred Bog boardwalks. Local health authorities approved SNC to begin work on seasonally closed Conservation Area sites to get them ready for opening, including work at boat launches and installing docks where site closures could be maintained.

Conservation Areas and associated facilities (docks, washrooms, play structures, etc.) will be opened when permitted to do so by health authorities. Signs are included at all Conservation Areas indicating permitted use or closure and COVID-19 precautions (including social distancing).

# C) Stewardship and Outreach Programs

#### **Tree Planting Programs**

Tree planting program activities were identified as essential services and SNC worked with partner nurseries, tree planting contractors and staff to establish precautionary



operating procedures to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission.

SNC completed work at cold storage facilities and delivered tree planting services on public and private land. Tree seedling lifting operations began on April 7<sup>th</sup>, with deliveries beginning on April 21<sup>st</sup>; staff completed tree planting activities on May 7<sup>th</sup> and contractors and forestry staff completed tree planting activities on May 16<sup>th</sup>. Over 144,000 tree seedlings were planted through Spring 2020.

Municipal Free Tree activities were carried out in some municipalities through online reservations and direct delivery or curbside pick up options through May.

## **Environmental Stewardship Program Delivery**

Programs with site visit requirements scheduled for Summer were postponed to the Fall and programs were adjusted to support delivery without site visits, including:

- Ash Tree Replacement Program
- Woodlot Advisory Service
- Roadside Tree Planting
- Clean Water Programs

#### **Environmental Monitoring and Reporting**

Routine maintenance on water quality gauges and provincial groundwater monitoring wells is completed as scheduled and sensors were deployed in various watercourses to support the South Bear Brook Catchment Study.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Board of Directors receive and file the Timeline Report for Permissions Under Section 28.

#### DISCUSSION:

South Nation Conservation (SNC), as part of Conservation Ontario's Timely Review Taskforce, committed to the following actions:

- Improve Client Service and Accountability;
- Increase Speed of Approvals; and,
- Reduce Red Tape and Regulatory Burden.

This initiative includes annual reporting on timelines and service standards for Section 28 permits (under the *Conservation Authorities Act*). The reports are provided to SNC's Board of Directors, posted on SNC's website, and submitted to Conservation Ontario.

It was agreed that interim reports would be submitted in May (January – March) and November (April – August) during the first reporting year (2020) to identify issues with reporting templates or internal processes.

The timelines for both Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) and Conservation Ontario (CO) service standards are provided below.

## **Timeline Reporting**

1. MNRF Reporting Standards, *Policies and Procedures for Conservation Authority Plan Review and Permitting Activities.* (2010) Service Standard.

The MNRF service standards are 30 (calendar) days for minor applications and 90 days for major applications from the date the application is deemed complete.



Major applications are highly complex, requiring full technical review, and need to be supported by comprehensive analysis or those that do not conform to existing CA Board-approved Section 28 policies.

# 2. CO Reporting Standards, *Client Service Standards for Conservation Authority Plan and Permit Review* Service Standard.

The CO service standards are 21 days for minor applications, 28 days for major applications, and 14 days for routine applications. There are also additional time allowances for resubmissions.

## **Permit Timeline Analysis**

This first reporting period (January 1 – March 30) provided staff an opportunity to explore and implement numerous improvements to our file tracking system.

Staff note that many files are put on hold by the applicant or delayed due to missing information or requirement for resubmission. SNC's file management software was updated to add the following:

- Ability 'pause' timelines due to CA requests for additional information to address errors or gaps in technical information submitted for review.
- Added "Agreement to Defer" between the applicant and the CA (where applications can be put "on hold" at the applicant's request).
- Added ability to add additional time for re-submissions (as per CO Client Service Standards).
- Added multiple reminders for technical review due dates.

We also note the following timeline considerations for this period:

- Staff required additional time for associated technical reviews as a result of critical timelines associated with the National Disaster Mitigation Program project deliverables. Generally, these delays were coordinated with applicants to ensure good customer service.
- Permitting staff received twice the number of new applications compared to the same time period in 2019. Processing this volume of applications was also impacted by adjustments related to the COVID-19 pandemic.



 SNC completed a jurisdiction expansion of ~120 km² including areas along the Ottawa River; we received several new permit applications and violation complaints in this area during this period.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Board of Directors approve the submission of a funding application to Fisheries and Oceans Canada requesting up to \$10,000 to collect data on unrated municipal drains; and

FURTHER THAT: The Board of Directors approve signing a Purchase Order from Fisheries and Oceans Canada to receive the funds.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) has funding available for Conservation Authorities to sample unrated municipal drains in 2020. These are drains that have no associated flow or fisheries information. SNC has received this funding from DFO annually since 2015.

DFO is prioritizing applications based on upcoming drain maintenance projects. SNC is working with municipal drainage superintendents to select drains for sampling in 2020 based on scheduled maintenance work.

The data collected is used by DFO to assign classifications to the municipal drains which streamlines approval of maintenance activities for municipalities. The data is also used by SNC and municipal staff in Planning and Approvals decision making.

The deadline for applications is May 29th, 2020.

#### **DISCUSSION/ADHERENCE TO BUDGET:**

SNC delivers many Program and special projects on behalf of our member municipalities and partner organizations. SNC has provided program coordination and financial management for many of these Programs for years.

This report provides a breakdown for each program/special project and its associated funds.

## 1. Eastern Ontario Water Resources Program (EOWRP)

SNC has delivered the EOWRP (formally Eastern Ontario Water Resources Committee) on behalf of its partners since 2003. Several EOWRP projects were approved in 2019 and will be completed in 2020; encumbered funding has been carried forward to the 2020 EOWRP budget. The United Counties Prescott and Russell has confirmed \$25,000 to EOWRP for 2020 to undertake a floodplain mapping project.

EOWRP included in 2020 SNC budget under Resource Management: Partner Programs: Water on pages 18-19. Special projects have a separate budget sheet as per below.

- a) UCPR Floodplain Mapping Project
   The United Counties Prescott and Russell (UCPR) is providing \$25,000 in
   2020 to support floodplain mapping projects within UCPR's jurisdiction. Project
   included in the 2020 SNC budget under Approvals: Projects: United Counties
   of Prescott-Russell Floodplain Mapping on pages 60-61.
- b) City of Ottawa North Castor River Catchment Study The City of Ottawa provided \$20,320 to the North Castor River Catchment Study in 2019; a total of \$5,320 was spent in 2019, the remainder (\$15,000) has been carried forward to complete the project in 2020. Project included in the 2020 SNC budget under Approvals: Projects: Subwatershed Studies on pages 68-69.
- c) City of Ottawa: Development of Groundwater/Surface Water Interaction Constraint Mapping The City of Ottawa provided \$7,109 to the Development of Groundwater/ Surface Water Interaction Constraint Mapping Project in 2019; a total of \$3,985 was spent in 2019, the remainder (\$3,124) has been carried forward to complete the project in 2020. Project included in the 2020 SNC budget under Approvals: Projects: Subwatershed Studies on pages 68-69.
- d) City of Ottawa Low Impact Development Project The City of Ottawa provided \$21,000 to the Low Impact Development Project in 2019; a total of \$2,263 was spent in 2019, the remainder (\$18,737) has been carried forward to complete the project in 2020. Project included in the 2020 SNC budget under Resource Management: Projects: Low Impact Development on pages 22-23.



e) City of Ottawa: Eastern Ontario Children's Water Festival
A total of \$2,013 was approved to the St. Lawrence River Institute of
Environmental Science to support the 2020 Eastern Ontario Children's
Festival in Casselman. Funding was carried forward for payment in 2020.
Project is a EOWRP grant to an external agency, EOWRP funding included
under Resource Management: Partner Programs: Water on pages 18-19.

## 2. UCPR Woodlot Advisory Service (WAS)/Roadside Tree Program

The United Counties of Prescott and Russell (UCPR), is providing \$20,000 for the delivery of WAS in their Counties. The funding will cover free site visits to woodlot owners by a forest technician, grants of up to \$500 for forest management plans, and communications and outreach for the service. Any surplus funding from the WAS program will be directed to Roadside Tree Program sites selected by the County. SNC has delivered the Woodlot Advisory Service in UCPR for the past 9 years.

## 3. SDG Roadside Tree Program

The United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry (SDG) is providing \$20,000 for planting of roadside trees along SDG County roads. Funding will cover SNC staff time to coordinate site selection and planting plans, purchase trees, and contracted services for planting, if required. This is SNC's tenth year delivering the Program for SDG.

## 4. SDG Woodlot Advisory Service (WAS)

The United Counties of Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry is providing \$35,000 for the delivery of WAS in their Counties. The funding will cover free site visits to woodlot owners by a forest technician, grants of up to \$500 for forest management plans, and communications and outreach for the service. SNC has delivered the Woodlot Advisory Service, 100% funded by SDG, since 2018.

Programs (2, 3, and 4) – included in 2020 SNC budget under Resource Management: Partner Programs: Forests on pages 16-17. An additional \$5,000 each was approved by SDG for the Woodlot Advisory Service and Roadside Tree Program for 2020, this combined amount of \$10,000 is not included in the 2020 budgeted revenue.

#### 5. City of Ottawa Special Levy Programs

SNC delivers several programs on behalf of the City of Ottawa and in partnership with the Mississippi Valley (MVCA) and Rideau Valley (RVCA) Conservation Authorities. These programs are funded via a Special Levy from the City of Ottawa.

Ottawa Special Levy programs are included in the 2020 SNC Budget under Resource Management: Partner Programs: Forests on pages 16-17 (Ottawa Ash Tree Replacement Program) and Resource Management: Partner Programs: Water (Ottawa Rural Clean Water Program, Eastern Ontario Water Resources Program, and Ottawa Baseline Monitoring Program) on pages 18-19. Please note,



2020 budget does not include all carry over amounts of encumbered 2019 funds and estimates that were included are lower than actual carry over amounts.

## a) Ottawa Ash Tree Replacement Program

The Ash Tree Replacement Program was developed and launched in 2018. The Program provides cost-share funding for landowners to remove trees infested with the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) and replace them with native trees. The Program is delivered City-wide by SNC on behalf of the City, MVCA, and RVCA.

SNC has requested \$200,000 for the 2020 Program. An additional \$117,073 is carried over from 2019 for approved projects, these encumbered funds will be disbursed as projects are completed in 2020.

## b) Ottawa Rural Clean Water Program

In addition to the 2020 allocation of \$200,000 from the City of Ottawa, \$115,561 is carried over from 2019 for approved projects, these encumbered funds will be disbursed as projects are completed in 2020.

SNC has delivered the Program, in partnership with RVCA and MVCA, since it started in 2000. As the Program lead, in addition to financial administration, SNC provides coordination for delivery, Program Committee meetings, and communications between the Program partners.

## c) Eastern Ontario Water Resources Program (EOWRP)

SNC has requested the City of Ottawa to approve a 2020 Special Levy of \$50,000 to support the Bear Brook Catchment Study (\$19,195); collection of baseline data on the catchment to support future subwatershed planning. The remaining 2020 allocation (\$30,805) will be made available to not-for-profit organizations, municipalities, conservation authorities, and academic institutes to undertake projects that protect water resources in Eastern Ontario. A call for proposals, projects review, and funding allocation will be completed through the Clean Water Committee. A small portion of the funding will support SNC staff to manage the proposals and the grant payment process.

#### d) Ottawa Baseline Monitoring Program

SNC samples 12 long-term baseline water quality sites across the City of Ottawa that are no longer sampled by the City. In 2020, staff will sample sites from July – December, the request of \$29,180 includes water quality analysis completed by the City's laboratory. SNC has been delivering this Program under a Special Levy since 2019.



## 6. Ontario Power Generation Regional Biodiversity Program – SNC Rivers/Lakes and Woodlands Projects

SNC was approved under the Ontario Power Generation (OPG) Regional Biodiversity Funding Program for a Lakes/Rivers project at J. Henry Tweed Conservation Area and Woodlands project at SNC's Gamble and Garlandside Road properties. Funding is for \$200,000 over 3 years, 2020 installment is \$75,000.

SNC Lakes/ Rivers and Woodlands project was not specifically included in the 2020 Budget, however, a portion of the revenue is reflected in Resource Management: Projects: Federal and Provincial Grant Programs: pages 28-29.

Subject: Update: SNC Insurance

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Board of Directors receive and file the SNC Insurance Update report.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

SNC is part of Conservation Ontario's group insurance program. The insurance provider is Marsh Canada Limited. At the January meeting the Board of Directors approved the renewal of the Authority's insurance with Marsh at an upset limit of approximately \$88,700 including HST, which is the amount in budget (BD-004/20).

In late March, the actual 2020 insurance renewal came in at \$92,138 including HST. This is an 18% increase from the 2019 premium of \$78,043 including HST. The policy was renewed, and the premium paid to Marsh in consultation with the Chair. The forecast has been adjusted accordingly.

According to Marsh reports, large premium increases have been seen across the global insurance market and are attributed to flooding and hurricanes in 2017.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS/ADHERENCE TO SNC POLICY:

## Compliance with Budget:

Total 2020 Budget allocation for insurance in 2020 is \$88,700 including:

- \$82,000 under Corporate Administration (Page 80/81)
- \$1,200 under Sewage Systems Review (Page 52/53)
- \$5,500 under Vehicles and Equipment (Page 40/41).
