I have looked into the matter, and according to the Corn Producers of Canada, about 40 to 50 per cent of corn grown goes to feed animals, about 20 to 25 per cent is for human consumption — of which about three quarters of that goes for corn syrup — and 25 to 30 per cent goes to ethanol. In the U.S.A., 40 per cent goes to ethanol. So much for the argument of feeding people — some large crop farmers are more concerned about feeding their bank accounts. When
