

This webmap allows residents to enter their address to view where the former and updated regulations limits and floodplain and erosion hazards are present.



A Lasting Impact: Land Donations Can Help Protect Canada's Ecosystems

Land donations and ecological gifts may hold the key to preserving Oanada's vulnerable ecosystems and maintaining natural heritage lands for years to come.

while easily overlooked, these natural while easily overlooked, these natural memories and important ecosystems. As society develops, however, these areas of undisturbed wildlife are becoming few and far between. With increasing populations comes increased pressure to adapt these spaces, making way for urban development. Growing reliance on farming and the rising need for housing are leading to the loss of critically important natural heritage land. Many Canadians don't fully understand the impact this loss has on the environment and future generations.

South Nation Conservation (SNC), one of Otatato's & conservation authorities, has made it its mission to ensure the preervation and restoration of ecosystems across Eastern Ontario. Like its conservation counterparts, SNC works alongside local municipalities, from the ClayOO that have through 15 runal municipalities near the South Nation, St. Lawrence and Ottawa Rivers, to support safe and sustainable development, finding waystochalance the

demands of society with nature and coolsy. The organization focuses on building strong, resilient landscape that can withstand becummer while conserving cologically significant land - creating what can only be described as a living gary for future generations.

Conservation authorities are recognized partners of choice for public land management, equipped with the resources and expertise to help manage, conserve, and restorethem.

Your land, your legacy

SWC can'do it alone. The organization relies on the generosity of like or indied landwares. Otherwise known as ecological gifts, land donations can allow landwares to retain ownership and access tax incontives while giving conservation authorities the power to work their magic, keeping potentially ecologically vital areas free of urban development. Most important, they offer property nonress confidencian in maintain inghie loitogrity and environmental security of their land for future generations.

After routicing an internationation of farming in the surrounding area, property owners George and Hennik Velema turned to the SNC to preserve their own reforestation work across their 67 acer property, nestied between the South Nation and Raitin Rivers. For the Velemas, donating their land to SNC through the Ecological Gifts Program gave them the confint of Knowing that the property they had nurtured for years would remain aspace dedicated to nature long after their retirement.

Conservation authorities like SNC and their local municipalities have worked tireleady for decades to ensure this beautiful country remains just that. We all have a responsibility to the diverse eccosystems that make up the Canadian landscape — not for ourselver, but on future generations can enjoy the same natural background so offent taken for granited.

Outreach: Social Media Campaigns



Buckthorn is a small shrub native to Europe and Asia and was introduced to North America in the 1800's as an ornamental plant for windbreaks and fencerows. Buckthorn is shade and drought tolerant and is therefore able to grow in a variety of habitats. This allows the invasive to spread quickly along roadsides, woodland edges, and unmanaged fields.

Buckthorn berries are an added food source for local birds; however, the berries have a laxative effect, which ensures the rapid spread of seeds and further invasion of the shrub. Buckthorn forms dense thickets and alters nitrogen levels in the soil, creating better conditions for its growth while discouraging the growth of other species. Advantages like these allow the invasive to outcompete native plants for resources, reducing biodiversity - and decreased plant biodiversity results in lower quality habitat for wildlife.





Earlier this week, staff were sowing native wildflower seeds to create a pollinator meadow at a roadside site in North Dundas. Thank you to the Township for taking the initiative and completing all the site prep!

The seed mix is locally sourced and contains species suitable for Eastern Ontario. Maintenance of the meadow will consist of mowing the site in 2023 to allow the wildflowers to root while controlling any grass and weeds that come back. The wildflowers will be allowed to grow and flower in the following year.



Most successful organic post since Nov. 2022 meeting


