## <u>Projects Updates - National Trails</u> <u>Coalition (ON)</u>

This program was announced at the end of June. In total the OTC had 93 enquiries for funding. Snowmobile had 89 projects come forward and ORV 19, for a total of 201 expressions of interest.

This led to 59 applications being received by non-motorized. 13 of these are mixed use, either non-motorized/snowmobile, snowmobile/ORV, non-motorized/ORV, or all 3.

#### Trailwise - National Trails and New Members



The total value of work on these 59 projects (without single snowmobile, or single ORV) is over \$21,000,000. The project costs alone are \$17,600,000. The dollars raised by the communities applying is over \$10,000,000 of this and the NTC contribution is of course maxed at \$2.1 million.

The Ontario Review Committee has met on one occasion to reconcile receipt and acknowledgements. We are working towards September approvals and communications.





### G2G and Huron Trails Working Group



Huron County staff members Cindy Fisher and Rebecca Rathwell have presented a proposal to County Council, calling for the creation of a working group to address issues surrounding the Goderich to Guelph Trail.

Tourism Co-ordinator Cindy Fisher explains some issues with land owners adjacent to the proposed trails have arisen as well as some misunderstandings.

Some land owners say they haven't been kept up to date with progress but Fisher points out there hasn't been much.

No lease with the province has been signed, and since the trail group's public meeting in Blyth last fall they've had several other meetings but she says it's a slow process.

Fisher suggests the working group should include representation by farmers and affected land owners; people from the G to G Incorporated Group; Huron and Perth planning departments; and someone from the Kissing Bridge Trail at the east end of the proposed trail.

Fisher points out they've been in existence for 20 years and could provide some advice on what has worked for them.

### Ivanhoe PP Updates

Good news is on the way for several Northeastern Ontario provincial parks according to the man who was a key part of a citizens' campaign to keep at least three of the parks open and operational for seasonal campers.

Malcolm MacDonald said this is especially true for Ivanhoe Lake Provincial Park, near Foleyet, which is a favourite for many campers from Timmins.

He told The Timmins Times this week that it appears that the plan by Queen's Park to shut down several provincial parks back in 2012 is being completely turned around . McDonald said that he expects Ivanhoe will be open for the 2015 season with no financial partnership required from the City of Timmins.

On the other side of the coin, the man responsible for Parks Ontario told The Timmins Times late this afternoon, that MacDonald's assessment is a bit optimistic and premature.

The whole parks deal was set up in 2012 after the McGuinty Liberals announced that 10 provincial parks in the Northeast would be closed to overnight camping as a money-saving measure. This caused outrage across the North since many Northerners regard camping as a popular summer lifestyle choice.

After several weeks of pressure from campers and politicians, the province agreed that Ivanhoe park near Timmins and Foleyet could stay open, along with Rene Brunelle and Fushimi provincial parks near Moonbeam and Hearst, respectively. The province recognized the parks as unique because of their historically high demands for seasonal camping.

As part of a pilot project, the City of Timmins agreed to cover any financial losses at Ivanhoe Lake Provincial Park for the summers of 2013 and 2014, while at the same time, encouraging local campers to use the park as much as possible and to purchase seasonal permits. It was expected the parks could be closed by 2015. The deal was the City would cover off any deficit, and if there was a profit, then the profit would go to the Ontario Government, through Ontario Parks, a branch of Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF). As lopsided as the deal sounded, City Council was ready to absorb a small deficit if it meant the park would continue operating.

The thinking was that a fully operational park near Foleyet would pay off by having the possibility of more travelling visitors arrive in Timmins, before and after their stay at Ivanhoe. People would buy gasoline, eat in restaurants or go shopping.
